


Origins of the Seven Clans


The Seven Clans


Symbol of the Cherokee Wolf Clan


Symbol of the Cherokee Deer Clan


Symbol of the Cherokee Bird Clan


Symbol of the Cherokee Paint Clan



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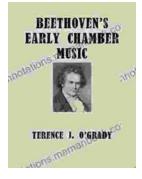


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
